

The message about the cross doesn't make any sense to lost people. But for those of us who are being saved, it is God's power at work. 1 Corinthians 1:18 (CEV)

- The power of the cross is about the person on the cross Jesus.
- The words from the cross connect us to the **person** on the cross.

But <u>God showed his great love</u> for us <u>by sending Christ to die for us</u> while we were still sinners. Romans 5:8 (NLT)

• The words from the cross connect us to the love of the cross.

For this is how God loved the world: He gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life. John 3:16 (NLT)

This is what real love is: It is not our love for God; it is <u>God's love for us</u>. <u>He sent his Son to die in our place to</u> take away our sins. 1 John 4:10 (NCV)

When they came to a place called The Skull, they nailed him to the cross. And the criminals were also crucified —one on his right and one on his left. Jesus said, "Father, forgive them...." Luke 23;33-34a (NLT)

- Who's Them?
- <u>The Soldiers</u>.
- The Roman Rulers.
- The Crowd.
- The Religious Rulers.
- "You and I".

But God demonstrates his own love for <u>us</u> in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for <u>us</u>. Romans 5:8 (NIV)

...Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." Luke 23:33–34b

What Jesus is saying:

They did not know **what** they were doing, because they did not know **who** they were doing it to.

"Friends, I realize that what you and your leaders did to Jesus was done in ignorance." Acts 3:17 (NLT)

None of the rulers of this age understood it, for if they had, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory. 1 Corinthians 2:8

They did not know \underline{what} they were doing, because they did not understand the \underline{impact} of what they were doing it.

We almost always manage to **excuse** what we are doing, and almost never understand the **extent** of what we're doing.

Every man's way is right in his own eyes, but the LORD weighs the hearts. Proverbs 21:2 (NASB)

Jesus was crucified so you don't have to keep <u>crucifying</u> yourself.

There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. Romans 8:1 (ESV) No one can take my life from me. I sacrifice it voluntarily. For I have the authority to lay it down when I want to and also to take it up again. For this is what my Father has commanded." John 10:18 (NLT)

Jesus on the cross reminds us:

- God takes <u>sin</u> very seriously.
- God loves us very seriously.

The greatest love a person can show is to die for his friends. John 15:13 (NCV)

God showed how much he loved us by sending his one and only Son into the world so that we might have eternal life through him. 1 John 4:9 (NLT)

Bottom line:

The cross reveals our sins are great but God's love is even greater.

 What we believe about God's <u>forgiveness</u> for us personally, directly affects how we personally <u>forgive others</u>.

How do I apply this?

"Father, forgive ______, for ______ know not what _____ doing."

Accepting God's Forgiveness:

I'm ready to **receive** the **healing** I need for my sin condition.

I'm ready to release others for their sin condition.

Questions for Connection Groups:
